Dear Families,

I hope you are all well. We have faced many changes this year in relation to COVID guidelines but I must say how impressed I am with the resilience and flexibility of our students and their families.

NAPLAN

NAPLAN started on Tuesday 10th May for Year 3 and 5 students. We have done practice sessions in class so your children were ready for the online tests which go until 20th May. NAPLAN is a series of four tests that help the school identify and plan for the literacy and numeracy needs of our students.

Free RATS

The state government has provided a box of 20 Rapid Antigen Tests for Covid for every student at school. If you haven't done so already, please collect your allocation from the office. If your child shows any symptoms or is a close contact, please test and let the school know if there is a positive result. Staying home and stopping the spread helps to reduce the impact of Covid on our school.

Vaccination Pop up Clinic

On Thursday 12th May, the Health Department ran a pop-up vaccination clinic for Covid at the Child and Parent Centre. Some of our families took advantage of accessing this clinic. We will provide details of the next clinic when it comes to Roseworth.

School Development Day

Roseworth PS will be having a School

Development Day on Friday 3rd June.

This day will be spent by staff learning strategies to assist with teaching phonics and literacy to our students. There will be no school for students on this day, however, it will be a normal day for Roseworth ESC.

School Moderation

At recent staff meetings after school, our teachers have worked with their colleagues from Hudson Park and Waddington PS to look at student work from Mathematics and Writing assessments to ensure consistency and share teaching ideas.

The football, soccer and netball teams competed against Dianella PS at home and Koondoola PS away, showing great teamwork and sportsmanship. 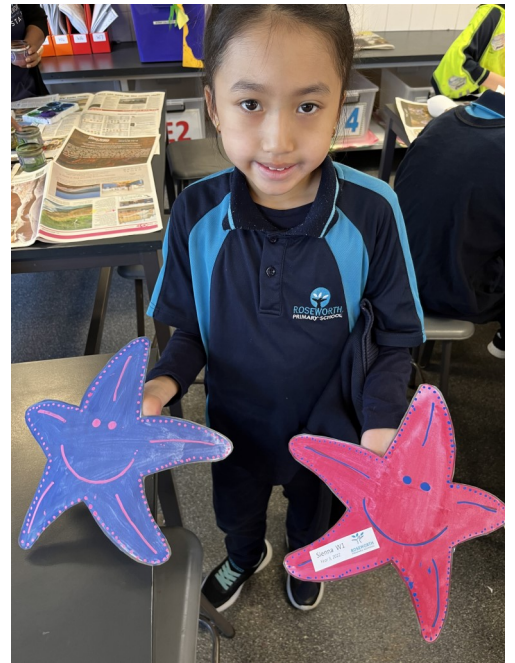

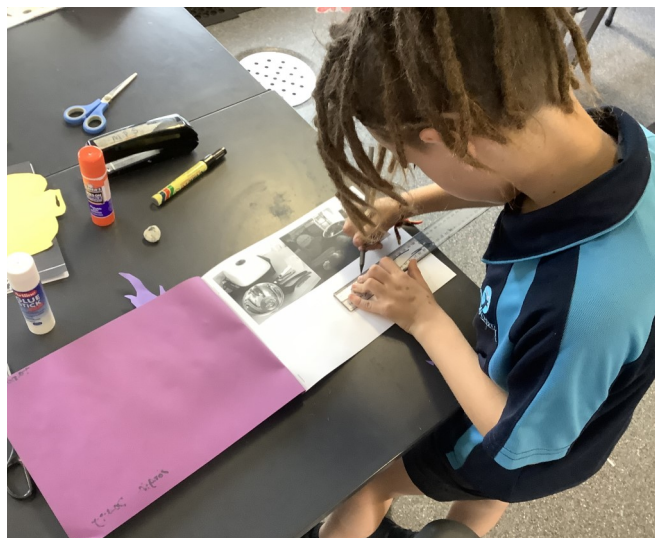
Art

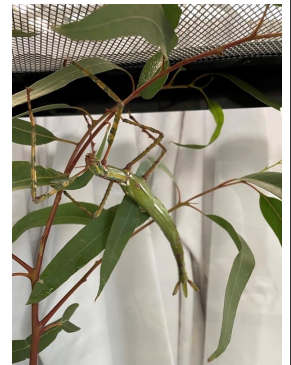
SCIENCE

knowledge of their degrees to estimate an answer. We enjoyed using hands-on materials, as well as Seesaw to present our work the class.



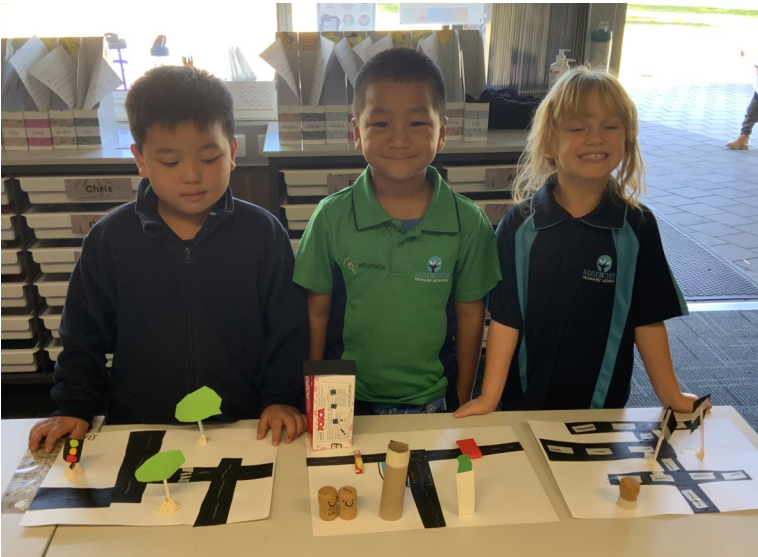
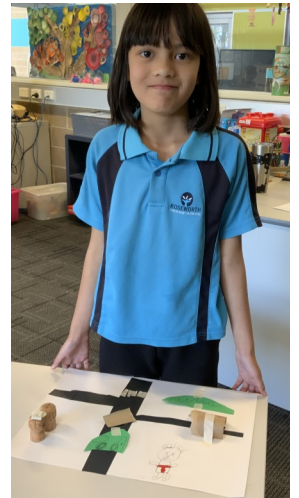
E4/E5

E5

This term the Year 1s have been learning about road safety. It's important to hold your parents' hand when you walk to school, buckle your seatbelt in the car and read the road signs before you cross the road. They used their knowledge of road safety to design and build safe streets that everyone could move around safely. There were some great bridges, zebra crossings and traffic lights.



E2

The Year 2 students in E2 are learning about narratives this term. They have been working on improving their ability to sequence and retell events. The students have also been demonstrating very pleasing group work skills.



E2/E3

Last week E2 and E3 made delicious kangaroo stew with Mrs Foley. While we were waiting for it to cook, Mrs Foley told us that the season we are now in -Djiran - is the best Noongar season to eat yongka (kangaroo), as they are fat from all the fresh new grass. She also told us that Aboriginal people didn't just eat yongka, they also used their skins to make a cloak called a booka, the shin bone to make needles and the sinew from their heels as a string for binding materials. We had no idea that yongka were so useful!

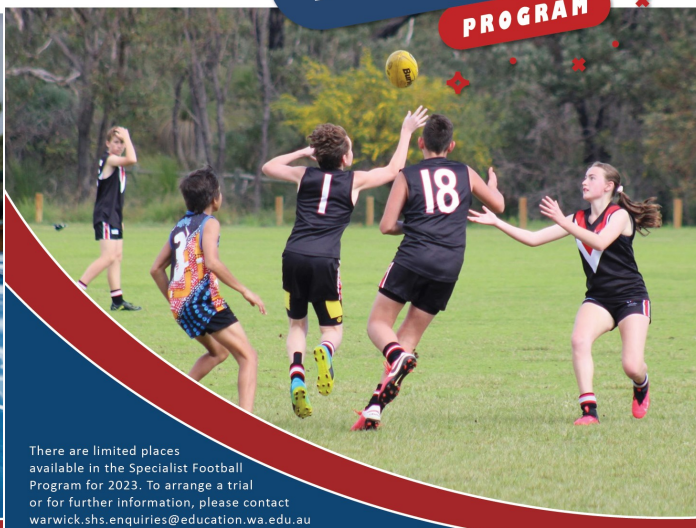
